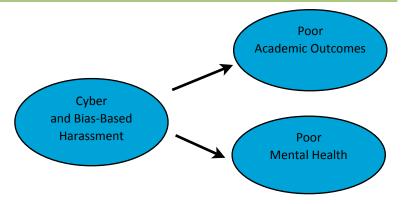
Cyber and Bias-Based Harassment News Brief:

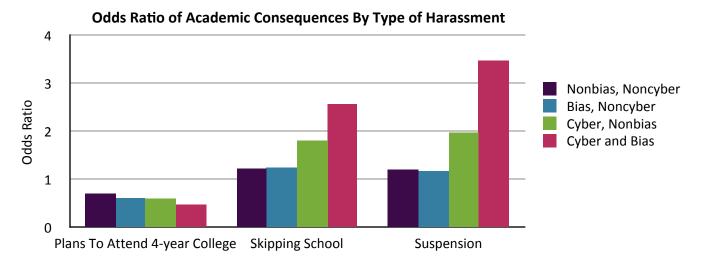
ACADEMIC AND MENTAL HEALTH OUTCOMES

Harassment is correlated with negative academic and mental health outcomes. Cyber harassment (internet and text) and bias-based (targeted based on ethnicity, race, or sexual orientation) are both associated with adverse academic and mental health outcomes.



FINDING 1: ACADEMIC CONSEQUENCES OF HARASSMENT VARY BY TYPE OF HARASSMENT EXPERIENCED

Victims of both cyber and bias-based harassment were least likely to have plans to attend a 4-year college and most likely to skip school and be suspended. There were similar trends for students who experienced cyber, non-bias harassment compared to those who reported bias, non-cyber harassment.







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FINDING 2: VARIABILITY IN MENTAL HEALTH OUTCOMES IS BASED ON HARASSMENT TYPE

Students who experienced cyber and biased-based bullying had greater odds of experiencing poorer mental health. When compared to a non-harassed group, those who experience cyber and bias-based bullying are: 4 times more likely to experience panic symptoms, nearly 5 times more likely to experience depression, and nearly 8 times more likely to attempt suicide.
